PREPARING FOR AN ASSESSMENT

- · Contact by email who is responsible for each stage?
- Who will be at visit?
- Type of facility?
- Visit will be set up by the rescue manager / owner, who will arrange directly with the fosterer.
- · Provide plenty of notice to the fosterer and be flexible.
- · Assess rescue HQ first, before fosterers.



AT THE VISIT / ASSESSMENT

- · Why you're there and what to expect.
- · Questions or concerns are welcome.
- Note taking.
- · Reassure them.
- · Open questions, e.g.,
 - "please could you tell me about a typi day when you have an animal in care?
 - "please could you talk me through who normally do once an animal leaves?"



TYPES OF FOSTER HOMES


- Whole house
- · Dedicated room
- Outdoor cat pens / dog kennels





DEDICATED ROOMS







- Easy to clean
- Lighting, ventilation & heating
- Minimal / washable soft furnishings
- · Separated from animals in the home



WHOLE HOME FOSTERING - CATS



- No other pets
- Recommend against young
 kittens / queen and kittens
- · Dedicated sanctuary room
- No outdoor access
- Hazards



OUTDOOR PENS (CATS)










eparate sleeping & exercise area dequately protected from the elements

RESOURCE PLACEMENT (CATS) - whether whole home or room/pen

- Litter trays separate to food and water
- Food and water separate
- · Hiding places and vertical spaces
- · Toys and feeding enrichment
- Facilities to scratch



WHOLE HOME FOSTERING- DOGS



- The basics diet, bedding, opportunities for exercise, toys, enrichment
- Crate use
- Dedicated 'sanctuary' space (if not crate trained)
- · Other pets in the home
- Leaving hours
- Outdoor access
- Hazards
- Training plans



RESOURCE PLACEMENT (DOGS)

- · Resources should be placed in an area that is
- Accessible
- Quiet and undisturbed with low traffic
- A dog should also be provided with
- Appropriate toys and feeding enrichment
- Suitable outdoor access



PROCESSES & POLICIES





- Frequency of comms: fosterer and rescue.
- Training
- Written policies and procedures
- Contact details in case of emergency e.g. illness or escape
- Vet visits
- Behaviourist access
- Arrangements if fosterer unwell.

HANDLING SENSITIVE CONVERSATIONS



- Be prepared for difficult conversations
- · Watch recording of ADCH webinar 'Radical Candor'
- Fosterer-facing language and tone
- Focus on facts and back up with evidence, use the Minimum Standards document.
- Constructive, what individual can do to meet standards
- Discussion, rather than one-way 'telling'- use questions to find out the other perspective

HANDLING SENSITIVE CONVERSATIONS



Recognition is a basic human need!


Be sure to provide positive feedback when things are done well.
